


Your Pet's Health Can Change Rapidly with Age

Beginning at around age 7, your pet enters his or her senior years. At this stage, pets often begin to develop diseases common to their senior human counterparts: diabetes, heart disease, thyroid disease and cancer. In fact, one out of ten pets that appear healthy have an underlying disease.1

The first step to keeping your pet healthy is to identify "true" age. Take a look at the charts below to find out if your pet would be considered a senior. Then talk with your veterinarian about what that means, and what extra precautions might be recommended.
